Introduction

Wayne County Hospital is a 25-bed Critical Access Hospital in Monticello, Kentucky. It is located about 30 minutes southwest of Somerset, Kentucky and about 5-8 miles from the shores of Lake Cumberland. Wayne County Hospital serves a region which includes residents of Wayne County, Pulaski County, McCreary County and Clinton County in Kentucky, and portions of Northern Tennessee on our southern border. The Wayne County Hospital was built in 1971 and redesigned in 1996 and 2003. Wayne County Hospital is fully accredited by the Accreditation Commission for Health Care (ACHC) and has a number of programs to meet the needs of its populations.

MISSION

VISION



CHNA Process

Wayne County Hospital contracted with the Community and Economic Development Initiative of Kentucky (CEDIK) in the Fall of 2023 to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for Wayne County Hospital in accordance with the Affordable Care Act. The Affordable Care Act, enacted March 23, 2010, added requirements that hospital organizations must satisfy in order to be described in section 501(c)(3), as well as reporting and excise taxes.

The IRS requires hospital organizations to complete a CHNA and adopt an implementation strategy at least once every three years. This CHNA was the fourth prepared by CEDIK for this organization; prior reports were completed in 2013, 2017, and 2020.

GOAL: Complete inventory of available resources in community.

Along with senior leadership, case management has created a list of resources for the community. WCH also developed an informational packet on the hospital to share with patients and community members.

WCH plays an active role in the community. WCH regularly attends Monticello/Wayne County Chamber of Commerce Luncheons, participates/hosts Health Council meetings, hosts Local Agency for Substance Abuse Policy (ASAP) meetings. Participants at these meeting represent local health community leaders such as EMS, LCDHD, Wayne County Extension Office, and Mental Health Agencies. Administration meets with community leaders such as Mayor of Monticello, Wayne County Judge Executive, Senator, and Congressman for continuity of healthcare progress in Wayne County.

GOAL: Increase public relations, marketing and health education in the Wayne County Hospital service area.

WCH has implemented strategic marketing strategies, such as utilizing social media, newspaper advertisements, and engaging in direct distribution to local and regional entities to share information about hospital services and resources.

In an effort to provide more health education to the community WCH have participated in community health fairs promoting healthy lifestyles. Community Served by Wayne County Hospital

Wayne County Hospital determined its defined service area for this Community Health Needs Assessment as Wayne County, KY by reviewing inpatient discharge data by county of residence in 2023. In that year, 61.6% of inpatients originated from Wayne County.





Community Steering Committee

The Community Steering Committee plays a vital role in the CHNA process. CEDIK provides a list of community leaders, agencies, and organizations to the hospital to assist them in the recruitment of committee members that facilitate broad community input.

These committee members represent organizations and agencies that serve the Wayne County population in various areas that relate to the population's health. By volunteering their time, the committee members enable the hospital to acquire input from residents who are often not engaged in conversations about their health needs. The steering committee provides an expert view of the needs they see while working with the people and clients they serve and in extensive distribution of the community survey. The community steering committee committed to the process both with promoting the survey through social media and encouraging organizations to share through email channels.

Wayne County Hospital leadership recruited members of the community to serve on the steering committee. CEDIK representatives scheduled and completed the first meeting in November of 2023 to introduce the assessment process, share the role of a committee member and to lead a focus group. A final steering committee meeting was held May 2024 for the report of survey, focus group and key informant interview results along with selected secondary health data to inform and guide the prioritization process of the identified health needs. This resulted in the community steering committee making recommendations on the priority health needs for Wayne County Hospital to address over the next three years.

Community Feedback

In November of 2023, members of the Wayne County Hospital Community Health Needs Assessment steering committee participated in a focus group. The committee membership includes representation from the Wayne County Health Department, Lake Cumberland District Health Department, Community-Based Interventions, Community Action Councils, and local assisted living administration. The committee membership includes representation from the ones they serve. Three additional focus groups were conducted with specialty court attendees, local Cooperative Extension staff, and the Wayne County Health/Interagency Council. Additionally, two key informant interviews were conducted in May 2024 with the Director of the Wayne County Senior Center, Jamie Simpson, and the Wayne County High School FRYSC Director, Audra Branscum. What follows is a summary of the responses that highlight the results of the conversations that identify strengths of the community and the healthcare system, challenges/barriers in the broader healthcare system and opportunities for improving the community's health.



Focus Group and Key Informant Findings

Qualitative analysis of focus group and key informant responses revealed overarching themes. Findings consistently underscored challenging experiences that hindered the community's ability to access services and the need for expanded services.

- Participants identified the community, healthy lifestyle opportunities, and access to care as strengths of Wayne County.
- The greatest health needs in Wayne involve improving access to health care, chronic disease, food access, healthy lifestyle choices, and economic security/community vitality. Social determinants of health particular to Wayne County heavily impact the community's view of the greatest health needs.
- There are two main categories of barriers to improving the health of Wayne County: barriers within the health care system, and barriers within the community.
- To better meet health needs in Wayne County, the community needs expanded services and education.



Prioritization of Identified Health Needs

Wayne County Hospital's CHNA steering committee meeting was held in May 2024 to review findings from the community surveys, key informant interviews, focus groups and county specific secondary health data.

The process of priority selection followed the Association for Community Health Improvement (ACHI) recommendations to consider:

- 1. The ability of Wayne County Hospital to evaluate and measure outcomes.
- 2. The number of people affected by the issue or size of the issue.
- 3. The consequences of not addressing this problem.
- 4. Prevalence of common themes.
- 5. The existence of hospital programs which respond to the identified need.

CEDIK staff led a facilitated discussion with members of the steering committee after the data presentation and completed the process of prioritizing the identified health needs. The following represent the recommendations of the steering committee to Wayne County Hospital for addressing health needs in Wayne County and the hospital service area for the next three years.

Prioritized Needs

- 1. Substance use disorder
 - a. Youth vaping
 - b. Alcohol use
 - c. Driving under the influence
- 2. Obesity
 - a. Diabetes
 - b. High blood pressure
 - c. Nutrition education
 - d. Healthy foods and cooking
- 3. Mental health

 - b. Impact of social media
- 4. Increased health services
 - a. Women's health
 - b. Increased cardiology services
 - c. Mental health screenings at primary care and other visits
- 5. Food insecurity

Implementation Strategy

After reviewing the recommendations of the Community Steering Committee, the hospital administration team created a plan to address the needs through the following goals and action steps.

Prioritized Need

- 1. Substance use disorder
 - a. Youth vaping
 - b. Alcohol use
 - c. Driving under the influence

GOAL 1: Increase drug and Substance Use Disorder (SUD) education in our community, local schools, and other programs.

Action Steps:

- Partner with the Kentucky Hospital Association to offer the SOS Opioid Stewardship Program.
- Partner with local law enforcement agencies and Lake Cumberland District Health
 Department to offer 2-3 educational events/opportunities such as American Heart
 Association Basic Life Support and Narcan education to help combat the overdoses,
 vaping, and impaired driving in our community.

Prioritized Need

- 2. Obesity
 - a. Diabetes
 - b. High blood pressure
 - c. Nutrition education
 - d. Healthy foods and cooking

GOAL 2: Increase education opportunities to the community that addresses obesity. Offer two events annually.

Action Steps:

- Host and/or participate in an annual Wellness Health Fair with other local health entities to focus on factors that contribute to obesity.
- Offer educational events annually to the public on topics listed above and offer preventative screenings.

 Partner WCH Registered Dietician with local UK Extension Office to collaborate and plan a Nutrition Fair that includes nutritional education and healthy foods to cook.

Prioritized Need

- 3. Mental Health
 - a. Resilient youth anxiety, coping skills, healthy activities
 - b. Impact of social media

GOAL 3: Increase awareness and education with local school groups such as Family Youth Resource Service Center. Participate in 2 events annually.

Action Steps:

 Actively participate in back-to-school programs and handout evidence-based resources to students on such topics.

Prioritized Need

- 4. Increased Health Services
 - a. Women's health
 - b. Increased Cardiology services
 - c. Mental health screenings at Primary Care and other visits

GOAL 4: Establish Women's Health Service in the Rural Health Clinic, expand Cardiology Services, and Mental Health Screenings.

Action Steps:

- Assess the possibility of establishing Women's Health Services in the Rural Health Clinic.
 WCH leadership team feels this is a service line that the community could benefit from.
- Increase Cardiology outpatient clinic days.
- Continue to promote and educate the public on Healthy Outlook program at WCH. This program focuses on Senior Behavioral Health and aims to bridge the gap in mental health in our community. Host 3-4 community events annually.

Prioritized Need

5. Food Insecurity

GOAL 5: Assist local food pantries to increase food stock and distribution. Have active engagement once per quarter with House of Blessings.

Action Steps:

- Partner with House of Blessings to promote awareness on food insecurity.
- · Seek out volunteers to help with meal delivery.

Next Steps

Hospital administration and staff along with community partners will develop an implementation plan that includes measurable goals, objectives, and action plan to address each identified priority health need in this community health needs assessment.

This Implementation Strategy will be rolled out over the next three years, from September 2024 through August 2027.

Wayne County Hospital will kick off the implementation strategy by initiating collaborative efforts with community leaders to address each health priority identified through the assessment process.

Periodic evaluation of goals/objectives for each identified priority will be conducted to assure that the hospital is on track to complete the plan as described.

Wayne County Hospital staff will review the implementation strategy and report on the success experienced through the collaborative efforts of improving the health of the community.
